

What if I do not have identification and need a birth certificate from a State that requires it?



1. Use a **work or school photo ID** card if the state allows any photo ID.

2. Get a **State I.D.** from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles (cost is \$8.50). Bring a primary AND secondary form of I.D. to prove your name, date of birth, and social security number.

Primary: drivers license, Bureau of Citizenship and Immigration Services documents, military ID, or passport. Also, if you have ever had a court case in Ohio, you can use a certified copy of your case as identification. Get a copy from the court.

Secondary: Social Security card or printout from the SS Office, medical records, military papers, school transcript, human services card, marriage certificate. Go to: www.bmv.ohio.gov/driver_license/sd.htm

3. If you do not have access to a state issued photo ID: Someone else may be able to get your birth certificate for you using their photo ID.

- **Family member:** Check the state's rules about which family members qualify and ask one of them, who has an ID, to request the certificate.
- **Legal representative:** This can be an attorney or someone you have given the power of attorney to.
- **Friend:** In a few states anyone with an ID can request a copy of your birth certificate.

4. Some states will allow a **notarized request** form to replace the photo ID. A notary may allow rent or utility bills to be used as identification.

How do I get a copy of my



Birth Certificate?

What information do I need?

- Name at birth
- Date of birth
- Place of Birth
- Mother' s maiden name
- Father' s name
- Current phone number and address

Who Do I Contact if I was born in Ohio?

A. If you were born in Ohio AND you know all of your birth information:



1. **Walk-In or Mail:** Go to the local health department office in the county where you were born. To find the address call the Ohio Department of Health at 614-466-2531. Note: costs vary by department.

2. **Walk-In:** Go to the Ohio Department of Health, Office of Vital Statistics to get it in person. This should take about 30 minutes. They are located at 225 Neilston Avenue, Columbus Ohio 43215. The phone number is 614-466-2531.

3. **Mail:** Send a signed letter that includes as much of the following information as you have: name at birth, birth date, place of birth, mother's maiden name, and father's name. Also include an address and phone number where you can be reached. This generally takes two to three weeks. Send to:

Note: If you were adopted prior to 2003 or changed your original birth certificate, you can ONLY get a copy at the Ohio Department of Health.

B. If you were born in Ohio but you do NOT know your date of birth or name as it appears on the birth certificate:

The Office of Vital Statistics can do a broader search of their records. Send all of the information you have to the Ohio Department of Health.



C. If you were born in Ohio but were never issued a birth certificate:

Send a letter to the Office of Vital Statistics to confirm that you were not issued a birth certificate. If they do not find one, you will be sent a letter telling you how to get one from a court.

How much will it cost?



A birth certificate through the Ohio Department of Health costs \$16.50.

Costs at the local health department offices vary from \$15 to \$20.

Veterans may get one copy for free.

If you need the Office of Vital Statistics to do a search for the year of birth it costs an additional \$3.00 for every 10 year period searched. If you need a search for alternate name spellings (Catherine, Kathryn, Katherine) each additional spelling costs \$3.

Pay by check or money order made out to "Treasurer, State of Ohio." Walk-In applicants can pay in cash.

What if I cannot afford to pay?

What if I was not born in Ohio?

If you were born in another state:

1. **By internet:** Go to www.cdc.gov/nchs/howto/w2w/w2welcom.htm

Click on the link for the state where you were born. There will be instructions on how to get your birth certificate.



2. **By phone:** call the National Center for Health Statistics at 866-441-6247 to get the phone number of the local office where you were born.

Costs for other states vary, but they are generally between \$10-20. You may need additional identification such as a current or recently expired (within 6 months) drivers license or State I.D. to get your birth certificate. (See back flap)

If you were born in another country:



If your parents were U.S. citizens, you must get your birth certificate from the U.S. Department of State. Call them at 202-955-0307 or write:

If your parents were not U.S. citizens, you must get a certified copy of your birth certificate from your country of birth.
